A Message from the School Principal Continued:

Many of our students have more than ten unexcused absences from school this year. It is so important for you to send your children to school every day. I understand that they need to stay home if they are sick but many of our students have no reason for missing school. Also, many of our students are arriving late to school. Students should arrive between 7:15-7:45 so they can get breakfast and prepare to begin their day. Students must be here if they are going to be successful in school. Please help us improve our attendance at Bissonet.

Please continue to monitor your child's grades. Reach out to teachers if you need to set up a conference. Ask your child to show you their Google Classrooms. You will find classwork and homework information from their teachers in the Google Classrooms. Students can also access different learning sites through their Clever accounts. Students in K-2 can work on their Lexia at home. Third through fifth graders can work on iReady and Zearn and students in 6th-8th can work on Zearn. Thirty minutes a night spent on these learning sites will help your children improve academically.

Finally, please make sure that your children are wearing uniform appropriate sweatshirts to school. The weather is getting warmer so there is not as much of a need for jackets. Sweatshirts can be worn in class if students are cold because of the air conditioning. Sweatshirts in pk-kdg must be purple, 1st-5th must be red and 6th-8th must be gray. Sweatshirts may not have hoods.

Technology:

All K - 8th grade students have been issued a district chromebook to use at school. These chromebooks are used for daily instruction, assignments and projects. All Pre-K students have been issued an iPad. It is important that we have a signed permission slip on file for ALL students. It isn't just for those taking the device home.

The agreement states that you are giving permission for a child to use the device and agree to the district's acceptable use of electronic equipment. If you need a new form- please contact your child's teacher.

Devices MUST come to school completely charged each day. Chargers should travel with the device.

State Testing: LEOLP

The LEAP test is right around the corner. Next month, students in grades 3-8 will complete the state test **online**. This means all students in grades 3-8 **must have their school issued chromebook AND charger at school**. This device is used to complete the test. If the chromebook is running low on a battery charge, the student will need to have his/her charger in order to charge the device.

All devices must remain on campus beginning April 17th.

Please talk to your child to ensure your child has a working charger. If your child reports that the charger is broken or missing, please send \$40.00 to school to replace the charger prior to LEAP testing.

Instructional Programs

All Bissonet students have access to Clever. Clever is a single sign on website that allows students access to different educational apps and websites that are used at school. Students have access to: iReady, Lexia- Core 5, BrainPop & BrainPop Jr., Nearpod, Edulastic, Zearn, LearnZillion, CKLA Hub, Stemscopes, WorldBook Online, Destiny (Library Catalog), and so much more!

During the school year, we encourage ALL students to work on iReady ,Lexia and/or ZEARN for a total of 45 min. per subject each week. Grades K-2: ZEARN Math and Lexia Reading. Grades 3-5: iReady Math and Reading and Grades 6-8 ZEARN only. If you have any login issues, please contact: christine.dauterive@jpschools.org.

Why are we sharing this? It is important for our parents to be familiar with this resource. We ask that parents assist their students with their learning at home by making sure they know how to login to the platform and access the programs the teacher assigns. In addition, we ask that students complete additional time on the iReady and Lexia programs- not just the time spent on the programs in the class. Zearn is a valuable Math resource, as it is aligned to the Math curriculum used in the classroom. If your child is struggling in Math- please talk to them about logging in to Zearn.



1st Grade:

What You Can Do as a Parent to Help Your Child be Successful in School

Ask your child how their day was. Ask them open ended questions so their response isn't, "Nothing." For example; the best part of my day was...? In math we did...? The funniest thing that happened was...? I was frustrated when...?



Read to your child. This is beneficial in several ways.

- They improve in listening comprehension.
- They build comprehension and you can ask them questions about their reading; therefore assess their learning.
- · They listen to a fluent reader, YOU
- You bond together for unforgettable memories.

Listen to your child read out loud. This will tell you how they're reading (fluency), what kind of book they're reading, and if they understand what they're reading.

Practice at home with your child about what they are learning in class. For example: review math facts, have them help you measure ingredients while cooking, count change, tell the time, or practice spelling words. This helps them practice and you will know how they are learning and/or retaining information.

Review progress reports, assessments, or graded work. Be aware of your child's grades, behavior, and progress throughout the school year. Are they understanding the curriculum? Are they behaving in class?

Support homework. Always do homework together. When your child does their homework alone, you will not be able to see their study habits or see what they need to work on. Don't forget it's their homework, not yours. They need to learn it, not you.

Routine is key! Children (and adults) love routine. Make sure they're going to bed at the same time or they do homework when they get home from school. When a routine is established, your child will feel at ease and know what's expected of them. A good life skill too!

Correct homework before turning it in. Be there to catch mistakes and intercept wrong conceptions. The average child needs to see something at least 9 times to understand and engrave it into their brain. If taught wrong, this increases to 16 times! Yikes!

Involvement makes a huge difference!
The more you are involved, the more you know what's going on with your child at school. Thank you for being there for your child.

Math: We will be starting Module 5 soon. These are the shapes the students will have to know and a description of each.

Our 2nd grade students are finishing their Civil War Domain this week. Next week, we begin our Domain on the Human Body. This domain first covers concepts regarding cells and how cells form building blocks of life on Earth. Students are then taught how collections of cells form tissues, and tissues form organs, and finally how organs work within the various body systems.


Math

We are finishing Module 6 this week. Please continue to practice with your child in the Module 6 workbook that we sent home. Module 7 will present an opportunity for students to practice addition and subtraction strategies within 100 and problem solving skills as they learn to work various types of units within contexts of length, money, and data. They will also revisit measuring and estimating length from Module 2 but now will use both metric and customary units.

Spring is here and we are busy learning and preparing for the last 9 weeks of school! We are excited to take our first field trip to see The Lion King musical. Be sure to check your child's red folder daily for important information and assignments. The students are also working on projects that we can't wait to see!

Math- We are wrapping up our module on fractions and getting ready to start decimals. Zearn lessons completed 3 times a week will help your child to succeed!

Science- We are completing our bundle on energy and will be starting our last bundle on waves. Our class has been given the opportunity to work with the T.R.E.E. program where we will be going to learn about science in an outdoor classroom for three days! We cannot wait for this experience!

English Language Arts- We have really been enjoying our Greek Mythology unit. So far, we have read various Greek myths, and we are about to read our main myth, The Lightning Thief. Ask us all about Percy Jackson because we will be able to describe his character in depth. We will learn all about Percy and the Olympians. Then, we will write a Literary Analysis comparing Percy's quest to Minli's quest.. Be on the lookout for our fabulous writings.

Social Studies- We really love social studies. We have been learning about the Industrial Revolution and many inventions that changed the world. We are almost finished with unit 5, and then we will be moving on to our last and final unit, Impact of Technology. In this unit, we will learn about the impact of inventions and technology on everyday life.

4th Grade Parents, please have our children explain what they are learning about in class each day. They should be able to communicate their learning targets in ELA, SS, SCi, and Math.

Have them take you on a journey through their electronic Google classrooms. Please be sure they are completing their homework assignments daily. Thanks!

ZEUS



Homerooms- Parents, please make sure your child's school bag is neat and organized. Also, check their red folders daily/weekly for any important flyers, as well as agendas/planners for homework assignments. Also, if students should be wearing a red uniform sweater as per uniform policy. **Lastly, we are going on a field trip March 17th** to see <u>The Lion King at East Jefferson High School!</u> :))) Please fill out the forms that got sent home and return the money by March 15th.

ELA- We are at the end of our unit, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe* by C.S. Lewis. Students have enjoyed reading this book due its fantasy elements. Along with the text, they have read others this month like "Down the Rabbit Hole" from *Alice in Wonderland* and "The Robin Who Showed the Way" from *The Secret Garden* series.

Students are getting closer to answering the big question of this unit: How can people understand the same experiences differently? They will express their understanding through a narrative that retells a key scene from the story from a first person point of view.

Social Studies- Students are on Unit 3 learning about the economic motivations for colonization in the early 17th century. Specifically, students have enjoyed learning about the fur trading business that took place in the northern colonies and the tobacco farming in the middle colonies. In addition, students are analyzing the economic and social relationship between the Native Americans and the European colonists in the midst of the development of the New World. Students will take a JPS Assessment at the end of this unit and will answer the big question: How are civilizations established?



MIDDLE SCHOOL:

Middle School News from Mrs. Wellmeier:

It's hard to believe that March is already upon us. The school year is flying by. We have accomplished so much this year, but we still have more to learn. Please make sure that your child is completing all assigned Zearn lessons each week. These lessons review the skills covered in class. When your child is absent, it is very important for them to check the Google Classroom and complete the work that they missed. Remember, each absence results in a missed math lesson. Please do your best to be present daily. LEAP will be here before you know it. Let's all work together to ensure that your child is prepared.

6th - We are wrapping up our Module on Rational Numbers. The students were so excited to finally learn about negative numbers. We used real life examples throughout this Module for example deposit versus withdrawal and above sea level versus below sea level. In Module 5, we will explore geometry including area, surface area, and volume.

7th - We are starting Module 6 Geometry. We will be doing scale drawings, solving geometry problems with inequalities, and finding surface area and volume. This is our last module in 7th grade. The remainder of the time will be spent on reviewing major standards throughout all of the modules and working on practice LEAP questions.


